# Albany & Oakdale First Out of Gate!

In the Oceanic Conference, the Albany Avalanche and Oakdale Ravagers turned in identical 48-22 Period 1 records! Albany did it with their league-leading offense, tops in AVG (.315), Runs (493), HR (64) and Walks (349), whereas Oakdale (2<sup>nd</sup> or 3<sup>rd</sup> in most offensive categories) did it with strong pitching (3.03 team ERA). Still, Duluth is in 3<sup>rd</sup>, only 6 games off the pace! It is worth noting that the Bronx's starting pitcher Jack Ogden socked two Grand Slams in one game on June 5<sup>th</sup> at home against Summer! (Ogden had no HRs in 1931 MLB!)

Over in the Atmospheric Conference, the Chestertown Blue Herons posted a 38-32 record, good enough for a 2-game lead over Sioux Falls and a 5-game lead over Arkansas. Only 1 game behind Arkansas are Bloomington, Summer and North Adams! It will be very interesting as intra-Conference play begins in Period 2. Can one of these teams stop Arkansas from winning their 12<sup>th</sup> straight Atmos Pennant?



The early batting leader is Oakdale's Spud Davis at a lofty .412. followed by Duluth's Earl Webb at .404. A dozen players are batting over .350! Oakdale's "Player of the Period" Babe Ruth is the early leader in HR (19), SLG (.674), Runs (70) and RC (83). Albany's Earl Averill is the RBI leader with 70. Teammate Lou Gehrig leads in EXBH (47) and Walks (69). The early SB leaders are Arkansas's Roy Johnson (14 SB, 5 CS) and Sioux Falls's Ben Chapman (14 SB, 6 CS).

The early ERA leader is **Oakdale's** "Player of the Period" Carl Hubbell at 1.94. Hubbell also leads in Strikeouts with 82 K. Sioux Falls's Wes Ferrell is 2<sup>nd</sup> at 2.45. Ferrell is the victories leader at 12-1. The early Saves leader is Bloomington's Carl Fischer (11/12 SVO, 20 GR, 1.77).






